Catchweed

Scientific name: Asperugo procumbens Common names: Madwort, German madwort

Biennial or perennial

Flowers bluish

Leaves opposite on upper part of stem

Calyx forms case about seed, and often catches in hair of animals

Found along roadsides, corners, fencerows, and sometimes in fields.

Stems simple or branching, low, spreading, 1 to 2 feet long; leaves 1 to 4 inches long.

Control: Use 2,4-D ester at 1 to 2 pounds per acre. Use lighter rates for selective spraying.



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
