#### HERE'S HOW

### to Grow a 4-H Garden

Enroll as a garden club member with your extension agent or local leader.

Your garden can be as small as 20 by 30 feet. More space is desirable if you have the room.

You can grow any kind of vegetables you wish. For exhibit, you need five kinds.

You must keep a record book.



You need a good fertile soil.

You need a planting plan.

You need good seed, planted right.

Keep the weeds out.

Water thoroughly when necessary.

Watch out for pests and get after them promptly.
