REPORT OF R. E. CLANTON, DIRECTOR OF HATCHERIES

LETTER OF TRANSMITTAL

Portland, Oregon, December 2, 1926.

To the Fish Commission of the State of Oregon.

Gentlemen:

Upon reassuming the duties of Director of Hatcheries June 23rd of last year, I found many of the experienced hatchery superintendents who formerly worked with me still in charge of their respective stations, and in most instances the new superintendents who had entered the Department during my absence were likewise experienced and efficient, all of who signified their willingness to give me their hearty co-operation. This, coupled with the fact that practically all of the important hatcheries and feeding pond systems of the state were installed during the thirteen years that I was formerly in charge, made it easy for me to take up and proceed with the duties with very little difficulty.

A survey of the various hatcheries disclosed the fact that in order to care for the increased number of spawn and young fish available, some improvement and extensions would necessarily have to be made, and the major improvements and extensions made during the past two years are set forth briefly as follows:

Bonneville Hatchery

Complaints had been made through the press and otherwise that the Bonneville Hatchery, recognized as a show place and visited by thousands of people annually, had been allowed to fall into a dilapitated and unsightly condition. This criticism was no doubt due to the fact that the grounds and surroundings had been somewhat torn up while the new concrete ponds were under construction during the latter part of the year previous, and that some of the buildings which had been standing for many years had began to show decay. Work was immediately started upon the repair of the buildings, grounds around the ponds were leveled up and

of the grounds conform with shrubbery added in order to make this part of the grounds conform with the rest of the surroundings.

According to Superintendent Howell's report, additional improvements consist of the laying of twelve-inch pipe line to furnish the water supply to the new concrete ponds. A new foundation was put under the west end of the main hatchery building and one hundred new hatching troughs installed. An entire new roof consisting of sheeting and shingles was placed on the main building. A new macadam road, thirty feet wide, was constructed, leading from the highway into the hatchery grounds, replacing the old dangerous bridge entrance which had been in use for many years. Three new dirt or natural ponds, thirty feet wide by two hundred feet long and three feet deep were built. A flum to furnish aeration to the lake ponds was constructed and one thousand eighty feet of flume, three feet wide, three feet deep, with covering and railing, was put in to replace part of the old flume which had become so rotten that it was of no further use. Repair work was made on the upper or main dam across Tanner Creek, some new timbers and plank being used. Improvements and repairs were made on a number of the other concrete ponds. A new gas house was built and gas pump installed, also a new food drier was constructed. The work enumerated is the most important and essential, but many improvements of a minor nature were made in the work of filling up grounds plant ments of a minor nature were made in the way of filling up grounds, planting flowers, etc.

Klaskanine Hatchery

A new foundation was put under the main hatchery building and a new floor laid, also a new slate roof was put on and other general repairs made to the building. A bridge leading to the feeding pond system was constructed across the river, and supports put under the pipe line on the North Fork from which the hatchery water supply is taken. Approximately one hundred and fifty feet of ponds were deepened and widened, with necessary dams and screens installed, materially increasing the capacity of this station. Some repairs were made on the other ponds and additional flowers and shrubbery put in.

A large pond or lake was constructed with a water supply furnished through an eighteen-inch pipe. This system was made in order to hold silverside salmon over the second winter or until they were eight or nine inches in length. There are now in this lake two million silversides, most of which are six inches long and which will be retained and liberated dur-

ing March or April of the coming year.

Herman Creek Feeding Ponds

A new cribbing was put in and repairs made to the dike in order to protect the feeding pond system. Repairs and improvements were made on some of the ponds. The buildings were given two coats of paint and a small food house was constructed. The land on which this station is located, having been in litigation for a number of years, was decided, the former owners being awarded five thousand dollars, which was paid. A new roadway was constructed under the railroad bridge, replacing the dangerous crossing, and making the grounds more accessible. In order to protect the railway roadbed a concrete wall was constructed along this new road.

Santiam Hatchery

A thirty-inch concrete pipe supplying water to the pond system was installed to replace the old wooden flume. A new six-room house with all modern improvements and a full basement was constructed for the super-intendent, and a pipe line to furnish the water supply was installed. The raising and paving of the highway in front of the hatchery building there made it necessary that considerable filling be put in around the building. Other improvements of a minor nature were made.

Willamette Hatchery

The improvemets at this station consisted of clearing up the grounds and enlarging the ponds, which increased the capacity of the station.

Wallowa Hatchery

A new woven wire fence was placed around the grounds, and a macadam roadway leading from the highway was built, the grounds leveled up and put into lawns, and shrubbery planted. The hatchery and other buildings were given two coats of paint. A food drier was constructed and a septic tank and connections put in. Two dams were built to protect the feeding ponds and many other minor improvements made.

McKenzie Hatchery

A complete new hatchery building, 40 by 80 feet, was erected at this station, one new retaining pond was built and a road leading from the highway, a distance of several hundred feet, was graded and macadamized.

Nehalem Hatchery

The surrounding conditions at the Nehalem hatchery, located at the mouth of the Salmonberry, made it impracticable for the building of a feeding pond system sufficient to take care of the needs of that stream. After going over the matter thoroughly, the fishermen of Nehalem Bay

and the business men of both Wheeler and Nehalem, represented by a committee, appeared before the Commission and protested against any further money being expended at that place and requested that the hatchery be moved to a location where an adequate system of feeding ponds could be provided. A desirable location was found on Foley Creek farther down the stream. After the location had been approved by those directly interested, work at this site was started in September of this year. Improvements so far made consist of putting a dam across the main Foley Creek in order to divert the water into an old channel which is almost one-half mile long and which when completed will be one of the best natural feeding pond systems in the state, with a capacity of at least ten million fingerling.

Gold Creek Hatchery

An entire new foundation was put under the hatchery building there and extensive work was done upon the feeding pond system, increasing the capacity of the station materially. A new food drier was constructed and other minor improvements made.

Nestucca Hatchery

Considerable work was found necessary at this station in order to put it in condition to hold the young fish until they attain the proper size for liberation. The plant, which was located in 1924, has good racking facilities, but affords poor opportunities for an adequate feeding pond system. However, a location was found near by on Little West Creek in which a natural feeding pond system was constructed. Several ponds have been made and when the system is completed it will take care of at least ten million fish. A new cottage for the Superintendent was installed and the grounds fenced and leveled, and other minor improvements made.

Alsea Hatchery

Improvements at this station consist of extending the feeding pond system and building a large flume to carry water over same. Also a flume was built in which the fish are liberated from the ponds above the dam. Considerable work was found necessary on the dam across the river.

Siuslaw Hatchery

It was found necessary at this plant to support the main building with new braces and rods. The troughs which had been put in the year previous had to be lowered in order that the operators might work more conveniently. A garage was constructed, some filling was done around the main hatchery and a fence placed around the grounds. A new pond was built and the old ponds were deepened, which increased the capacity to a considerable degree.

Umpqua Hatchery

A complete new hatchery building, 40 by 80 feet, with a concrete floor, provided with sixty new troughs, was built. Eight hundred and eighty feet of flume was constructed to provide water for the sysetm. Three ponds, approximately four hundred feet long, with a capacity of three million fingerling, were built, and a new seven-room dwelling for the superintendent, 24 by 36 feet, was built; also a store room 16 by 36 feet. The grounds were leveled and laid off in lawns and driveways and walks were provided.

This new plant is one of the most modern and complete in the state, but owing to the unfavorable location of the ground surrounding, it is impracticable to increase the present feeding pond system, and as the Umpqua River is one of the most important streams in that district, it is evident that the capacity of this plant is not large enough to increase or keep up the supply of fish in that stream. After the appearance before your body of a delegation representing the fish dealers, business men and fishermen

of the Umpqua River, the construction of a feeding pond system was authorized on Little Mill Creek near Scottsburg. A survey and plans have been made and work upon this system will be started immediately after the first of the year in order that it may be put in use during the coming season.

South Coos Hatchery

No extensive improvements have been made at this station. The grounds surrounding the cottage and hatchery were leveled off and some additions were made to the feeding ponds.

Coquille Hatchery

Maintaining that money collected from their stream had been diverted elsewhere, the fishermen requested that some hatchery operations be carried on on that river. A desirable location was found on the south fork a few miles above Powers. A battery of hatching troughs was installed, a small cottage for the superintendent was erected and four natural feeding ponds were built. When funds become available this, like the new plants on the Nehalem and Yaquina, should be improved and increased to a larger capacity.

Yaquina Hatchery

A delegation of fishermen and dealers operating on Yaquina Bay and River appeared before your body in September of last year, strongly urging that hatchery operations be started upon that stream. A survey was made on Simpson Creek and it was found that an adequate feeding pond system could be made in the creek bed itself by constructing a large flume to carry the surplus water over the same during freshets. Owing to the lateness of the season it was impracticable to construct the ponds and erect hatching troughs, but arrangements were made with Ryckman and Martin, who operate a private trout hatchery on Spencer Creek, for the use of their plant, and one and one-half million fry were hatched and held there until the ponds were in condition to hold them in the early part of this year. During the summer a dam was constructed and a battery of hatching troughs were put in near the pond system, in which eggs are now being hatched.

Rogue River Hatchery

Rogue River, being the property of the Macleay Estate Company, is merely operated under the supervision and at the expense of the Commission.

Hatchery Operations

I respectfully call attention to the table set forth herein showing the output of young salmon liberated from the various hatcheries of the state during the past biennium. From the comparative figures given it will be seen that the output of young fish was increased 76,685,215 over that of the two previous seasons, and which is of special importance to the future of the industry these fingerling were held and fed, on an average, for a much longer period before liberation. It will also be noted that during the past two years the aggregate cost of taking the spawn and handling the young fish was twenty-four and two-thirds per cent (24%%) less than the two previous years.
