INTRODUCTION

This inventory describes the records of the National Forest Products Association (NFPA) that are deposited with the Forest History Society in Santa Cruz, California. These records, occupying seventy-eight feet of shelving, are heavily concentrated in the period from the 1920s to the 1960s, although a few items date as early as the founding of the association in 1902 and circular materials are included from as recently as 1975.

The NFPA, known until 1965 as the National Lumber Manufacturers Association (NLMA), serves as national spokesman for federated trade associations whose membership comprises major regions, species, and products of the lumber and plywood industry in the United States. The national organization is financed from dues paid by the federated associations and by direct member companies. Members are represented on the board of directors by votes in proportion to the amount of dues paid, except that every federated association member has at least one seat on the board. The NFPA executive committee is comprised of representatives of those members. As of July 1976, there were twenty-six federated associations, three contributing associations, and six direct company memberships.

Each of the basic activities of NFPA is assigned to a committee of the board of directors, and each such committee is supported by a staff department. Although complicated by many reorganizations and overlapping of personnel between departments over seventy-five years, this functional organization is reflected by the arrangement of the records described in this inventory. Generally the basic activities and services of NFPA and its predecessor NLMA have included forest conservation, research, public relations, statistical information, utilization and waste prevention, transportation, law information, governmental relations, lobbying, standardization of products and terminology, trade promotion, engineering, insurance, credit rating services, and administration, although not all of these activities and services are reflected in the records held by the Forest History Society.

To encourage public support during the depression of the 1930s, NLMA established a publicity and trade promotion arm known as the American Forest Products Industries, Inc. (AFPI). The executive committee of NLMA served as the board of trustees of AFPI, while the chairman of the NLMA trade promotion committee was AFPI president. The Timber Engineering Company (TECO) was established in 1932 as a subsidiary of AFPI to promote the use of lumber in engineering construction. In 1946

AFPI became an independent organization and was renamed American Forest Institute (AFI) in 1967. The historical records of AFI are held by the Forest History Society. This collection covers the period 1940 to 1967, measures some sixty-five linear feet, and is available for research use. TECO materials appear in NFPA and AFI records.

In 1943 NLMA joined with the two other national trade associations concerned with forest industries, the American Paper and Pulp Association and American Pulpwood Association, to form the Forest Industries Council (FIC), which discusses and makes recommendations concerning the joint interests of its members, although its actions are not binding on the member institutions. The chief elected and executive officers of the member associations hold seats on the FIC, which was later expanded to include AFI and the American Plywood Association. Records relating to the FIC are in subseries 44/13-22 of the NFPA records.

In 1961, prior to moving into its present quarters in the Forest Industries Building at 1619 Massachusetts Avenue, N.W., Washington, D.C., the NLMA selected from its noncurrent records those materials which its staff members thought might have permanent historical value and discarded the remainder. At this point, Elwood R. Maunder, executive director of the Forest History Society, then of Saint Paul, Minnesota, offered his services to ensure that nothing of continuing value was lost. The records remained in the hands of the NFPA, however, until 1967, when the association deposited thirty-two file drawers and three cartons of the materials with the Forest History Society. By then the Society was located at Yale University, New Haven, Connecticut, with its archival holdings in Sterling Memorial Library. Later in that year, at the request of NFPA, the Society returned a quantity of printed material which had been included in the records. Historical files preserved by NFPA, but held back when the deposit was made with the Forest History Society, include records of all meetings since formation of the NLMA in 1902. NFPA subsequently has made additional deposits of its records, consisting of personal papers of Henry Bahr, vice president and general manager, which were presented to the Society upon Bahr's retirement in 1969; and circular letters to committees, directors, and federated associations, which have been deposited each year.

The Forest History Society prepared a shelf list of folder titles for this collection in 1971, after moving to its present library and headquarters at 733 River Street, Santa Cruz, California. While compiling the present inventory, the Society also prepared a container list of series. Both of these lists are useful supplements to this inventory.

Prior to depositing these records with the Forest History Society, NFPA assigned numbers to about half of the files and inserted 3 x 5 subject cards in the catalog of the association's library. This catalog was donated to the Society along with the records and may still be used as a subject finding aid. The user should be aware, however, that not all of the cataloged records were among those accessioned by the Forest History Society.

On May 28, 1975, Elwood Maunder of the Forest History Society and Joseph Cook, secretary of the National Forest Products Association, signed a formal agreement transferring to the Society legal title to the collection and literary property rights in all unpublished materials therein which were personally or corporately created by the NFPA.

Of particular interest are historical files (1902-1952, 3 1/2 inches, 3 f. & loose material), known as the "NLMA Archives," which contain reprints of articles, correspondence, briefs, organizational charts of NLMA, American Forest Products Industries, Timber Engineering Company, NIRA programs, memoranda giving historical summaries, clippings, lists of delegates, lists of officers, speeches, regulations, and other historical data.

These records largely relate to the work of Alf Z. Nelson, forest economist, and concern NLMA's position on federal legislation and proposed federal legislation. Included are printed bills, hearings, committee reports, and laws; correspondence, memoranda, notes, telegrams, drafts of proposed legislation and amendments, minutes, drafts of statements, transcripts of testimony, speeches, analytical reports of bills, maps, newsletters, brochures, press releases, circular letters, transcripts of conservationist propaganda, issuances of the National Industrial Council, U. S. Chamber of Commerce, and other organizations. This series includes both files relating to legislation which was the subject of NLMA lobbying activity and files of information collected on other legislation of relatively minor interest to NLMA. Subjects of legislation include federal-state-private cooperative forestry, coordination of federally sponsored programs, U. S. Department of Agriculture, federal timberland ownership, timber production, tax revenue, effect of reclamation and hydroelectric projects on timber supply, proposals for federal regulation of private forestry, forest finance, U. S. Forest Service programs, multiple use, recreation and its impact on other forest uses, farm forestry and forestation, federal appropriations, proposed governmental reorganization and new agencies, abuse of mining laws for land acquisition, jurisdiction of federal agencies, watershed protection, logging access roads, and other topics relating to the effect of federal legislation on timber supply and production.
