The Extension Service of the Oregon Agricultural College embraces all instructional work done by the College staff outside the institution, and Farmers' and Home-Makers' Week at the College. This includes institute, lecture, and fair work in all its varied phases, supervision of the county demonstration and farm work provided for by state legislation; Boys' and Girls' Industrial Club work; correspondence courses; preparation of educative exhibits; publication of bulletins and distribution of news matter; cooperative work with granges, farmers' unions, schools, churches, commercial clubs, and other progressive organizations in the promotion of industrial and social enterprises. The Extension Service, in short, consists of carrying out to the people of Oregon practical and usable information on all subjects taught at the College.

Application for assistance along any of the lines indicated, together with all particulars relating thereto, should be sent to the Director of Extension as far in advance as possible. It is the desire of the College to help all who apply, but its staff, facilities, and funds are limited; consequently, short notice requestions may not find the service in position to render the best service.

Particular attention is called to the fact that counties desiring to organize for agricultural field and demonstration work, under the provision of Chapter 110, Laws of 1913, must make an initial appropriation in order to secure the State aid. Those interested in promoting this work should communicate with the Director of Extension, or the County Agent Leader, at the Agricultural College, with reference to the best methods of procedure.

Farmers' and Home - Makers' Week and Convention Sessions.

Oregon Agricultural College Corvallis, Oregon.

January 2nd to 6th inclusive.

The instructional work outlined in the following pages is offered in the belief that it is of sufficient value to the people of the State to justify their coming to the Agricultural College to attend the exercises. The lectures and demonstrations will be practical and to the point. The subject matter will be of interest and profit to farmers, business men, housewives, and all men and women interested in the industrial progress, the social betterment, and the general welfare of the State.

Approximately twenty-five conventions and conferences will be held during the sessions for the consideration of particular problems. A serious attempt will be made to outline plans of campaign which will be effective in securing results during the next year. The assistance and counsel of all interested persons is desired.

Entertainment.—Everything possible will be done to make it pleasant and profitable for those who attend the exercises. Committees of the faculty will meet guests at the trains and assist them to secure accommodations. Throughout the week guides will be available for those who wish to inspect the College plant.

Accommodations.—Room and board may be secured in private families in Corvallis for from \$5.00 to \$6.00 a week. Rooms without board are about 50 cents a day. Board and room at Waldo Hall may be secured by women at \$5.00 a week. Regular meals for the five days, by both men and women at about 50 cents a day.

Visitors are requested to report at the Information Bureau in Agricultural Hall where a complete list of rooming and boarding places is available. Attendants will be glad to give any desired information. Members of the accommodation committee will meet all trains and will be pleased to assist visitors to find satisfactory accommodations.

Railway Rates.—The various railways of Oregon, Washington and Idaho have granted a rate of a fare and a third on the certificate plan. All those who are planning to come should be sure to secure the proper receipt from their local agent at the time they purchase their ticket. These receipts must be signed by the Secretary of Extension, Room 128, Agricultural Hall, before purchasing return ticket.

Registration.—All who attend the lectures should register at the Information Bureau in the Agricultural Building at the earliest possible moment after their arrival. There will be no fees or charges of any kind.

General Assemblies.—Every day from 11:00 to 12:00 o'clock there will be a general assembly in the Women's Gymnasium, at which time there will be offered a program of music, dramatic readings, and addresses by some of the best talent the State affords. Wednesday and Thursday evenings at 8:00 o'clock in the same building there will be programs consisting of music, and lectures by prominent speakers and leaders.

Exhibits.—Elaborate exhibits will be on display throughout the week.

The Domestic Art department will have an exhibit of basketry, evening gowns and other features on the third floor of the Home Economics Building, January 4th and 5th, from 5:00 to 6:00 o'clock.

The Domestic Science department will have an exhibit in the basement and on the first floor of the Home Economics building, January 4th and 5th, from 5:00 to 6:00 o'clock.

There will be a Pork Products Exhibit in connection with the Hog Producers School, Friday afternoon, 1:00 to 3:00 o'clock, in the Agricultural Building, Room 221.

A special educational exhibit is being arranged by the department of Dairy Husbandry, Dairy Building.

Kindergarten and Nursery.—The Y. W. C. A. girls have arranged for a kindergarden and nursery in Shepard Hall throughout Farmers' and Home-Makers' Week and will take care of children from one to ten years of age. The girls chosen for this work are especially adapted for story telling and games. The hours are 7:50 to 12:10 and from 1:00 to 5:10. A charge of ten cents per hour or twenty-five cents per half day is made for each child Special rates will be given for the week or for two or more children.

Musical Numbers for daily conventions and for special lecture hours will be contributed through arrangements by Professor William Gaskins, Director of the School of Music.
