

I usually tell the requesting organization or individual that I have other volunteer work that I do, such as ski patrol and writing for non-profit magazines. Therefore I will require a stipend and travel funds to visit classes or share my expertise. The amount varies by distance and my prior relationship with the individual or organization. Sadly, some requests are withdrawn at this point.

Major keynotes, especially outside of Oregon, were difficult when I was working fulltime; I said "no" to one invitation twice and found time to respond favorably once I was no longer full-time at OSU. Now I like to do a major keynote or consulting workshops about 3-4 times a year.

Continuing to teach was a natural course of action for me. I already taught a class online two times a year. When I first retired this course was taught 3 times a year, it is now, again, twice a year and I believe this is a better rhythm for me now. The course can be taught from anywhere, so it does not interfere with my travels.

Additionally, I had wanted to teach a course for the Honors College for years and had not had time in my schedule. Once I moved to emerita status, I decided to teach a course for the Honors College and now teach it with my colleague Natalia Fernández. I have enjoyed supporting Natalia as she teaches. I have continued to learn much from this collaboration both from the students' original research and from Natalia's depth of archival knowledge and procedures. I receive about ¼ of the compensation that I received teaching the same credit class as I did when I was a full-time tenured associate professor. So, more than ever, there must be pleasure in it for me.

My textbook, Cultural Competence: A Primer for Educators may go into a 3rd edition. I keep files of materials both hardcopy and online in case that opportunity opens up. I no longer write research articles.

Beginning in 2007, I began to write a regular column for Skipping Stones A Multicultural magazine. It was a challenge during the 60 hour/week years to keep it up, but I did knowing that it would be easier and a pleasure to continue writing for the magazine as I "retired." The materials in the columns were mostly easier-to-read and digest materials from my textbook and other professional writings. In 2012 I gathered 5 years of columns into a book of its own, Ask Nana Jean About Making A Difference. I sold 300 copies of this first edition, continued to write columns and put out a 2nd edition in 2013 that is available on Amazon and is selling well. Both editions are illustrated by my artwork. My undergraduate major was art and emerita status has given me the time to pursue this passion!

Beginning in 2013, I began to take flying lessons. I find that I write a blog about this experience every other month for Flight Training magazine.

In all areas of my life I often rely on my emotional response to the item for making decisions. I tend to involve myself in areas that both bring out the best in me and where I believe I can make a difference.

> Wherever and whenever possible I will continue to make those choices in the coming years. Large time commitments for my personal life as a grandmother, wife, and mother and my on-going volunteer work as a ski patroller underlie all of the years of this chart and continue on and strong. As you can see from my 2014 column, I will continue to teach, travel, watercolor, and consult. As I look forward to 2014 and 2015 my highest priority is the completion of my autobiography, Kili and Me, based on my climb up Kilimanjaro in 2007. My trek through 6 climate zones is an organizer for three strands of my life: individual, family, and society. The story includes my growth from an isolated black child to a contributing scholar in my field within the context o history, and the change of racial relations during my lifetime illustrated by my 50-year interracial life partnership. My internal struggles during this journey surface as I tell stories as I travel on the well-worn, steep trails upward to Africa's highest point.

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Dr. Jean Moule earned her BA from UC Berkeley in the turbulent '60s and her Ph.D. from Oregon State University; she has been on the faculty at OSU since 1998. She moved to Emerita status in 2010. Moule's areas of expertise include cultural competence and teacher preparation for a diverse student population. She is the author of Cultural Competence: A Primer for Educators. Natalia Fernández began working at OSU in 2010 as the curator of OSU's Oregon Multicultural Archives which is dedicated to preserving and sharing the histories of people of color in Oregon. Moule and Fernández began their professional relationship through Moule's donation of an archival collection to the archives and subsequent oral history interviews. The two have since collaborated as co-instructors of an Honors College
