This leaflet has been prepared to accompany College Bulletin No. 82, "Incubating and Brooding Chickens." Save this Bulletin as it will soon be out of print.

The following questions have been arranged in such a way as to bring out the important points in the Bulletin "Incubating and Brooding Chickens". The purpose of the questions is to test the reader's knowledge of the subject after the lesson has been studied.

It is suggested that in making a study of the lesson it be read through first. Then it should be reread more slowly and the important points underlined with a pencil or pen. It may then be gone over again. A good plan will be to have another member of your family ask you questions about the lesson after you have studied it.

1. Why is hatching and raising chicks of such great importance?
2. Why is it important to know something about the hens which laid the eggs?
3. What factors may cause a lack of vigor in the chicks?
4. How do artificial methods of hatching compare with natural?
5. Why is it cheaper to use natural methods?
6. Under what conditions would artificial methods be an advantage?
7. Describe the home made brooder and tell how it is used.
8. Tell something about the selection of eggs for hatching.
9. Under what conditions will the eggs have the greatest per cent of fertility?
10. How Should the sitting hen be cared for?
