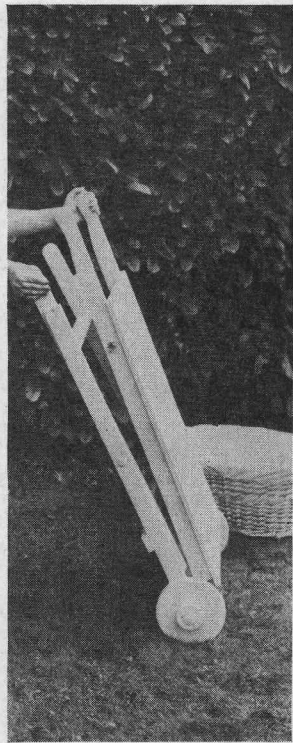


# THE LAUNDRY CART

A two-wheeled cart with a table top not only will be a labor saver on wash days but also will be handy to use for outdoor picnics and garden activities.

Many women when they hang up the family wash waste time and energy by putting the clothes basket on the ground, then stooping to pick up each article and walking back and forth from basket to line.

By using this cart, the clothes basket will be placed at waist level and can be wheeled along directly under the clothes line.

The cart folds compactly for storage.

The three parts of the cart are bolted together with the bolt heads set in counterbored holes so the cart can fold. A hardwood dowel, 1 inch by 26 inches, is used for the axle. The holes in the wheels will have to be large enough to fit loosely over the axle, to prevent binding when the wood gets wet and swells.

The height of the cart will be determined by the location of the bolts in the top unit; these are held by wing nuts.

If the cart does not stand level, change the length of the legs.

Another type of folding laundry cart may be purchased at most stores where laundry supplies are sold.
